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INTRODUCTION

THE FIRST SESSION OF THE 57TH LEGISLATURE WAS MARKED BY FRESH FACES AND FRESH ATTITUDES. FORTY-SIX HOUSE MEMBERS SERVED THEIR FIRST SESSION AND 76 SERVED THEIR SECOND SESSION OR LESS.

Twelve Senate members served their first session with 28 members having less than one full four-year term under their belt. A new governor and several new statewide elected officials were sworn into office, and the legislature was presented a nearly \$600 million budget surplus. These factors combined to create a new optimism and a new energy to focus on challenges hindering Oklahoma's progress.

While the Republicans entered the session with super-majorities in both chambers (77-24 House; 39-9 Senate), a spirit of cooperation and collaboration seemed to prevail throughout the session. While there were issues that became contentious, for example the budget was passed on a completely partisan vote, issues impacting businesses were generally supported.

One example of this new spirit of cooperation and collaboration was HB 2367, the Worker's Compensation Act. This bill was very contentious, however, after months of hard work and collaboration, a compromise bill was passed unanimously in both chambers. The final version protected the worker's compensation reforms the business community gained during the previous few sessions.

The legislature also took steps to add transparency to the budget and add accountability to the process. SB 1 creates the Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency (LOFT) which provides for an oversight committee structure and outlines duties and responsibilities of the office and the agencies it oversees.

While the session was generally pro-business, one bill passed that was certainly not. HB 2632 creates the 'Patient's Rights to Pharmacy Choice Act', which sets requirements on insurance providers and pharmacies to broaden patient access to care and improve transparency of the pharmacy process. While the goal of the bill is good, and the bill will help small pharmacies, the bill is bad for other businesses and consumers. First, the legislation requires contracts between private businesses to be reviewed and approved by the Oklahoma Insurance Department rather than be contracted on the open market without government intervention. Second, the bill will raise the cost of health care for every business that provides health insurance to their employees. For example, the OMES's Employees Insurance Group Division staff estimates HB 2362 bill will cost the state of Oklahoma an additional \$5 million in health care costs in FY-20. The measure will also raise the cost of insurance to consumers who purchase their own policies. Finally, the bill does not exempt

policies provided under the federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). By not exempting ERISA plans, HB 2632 pre-empts federal law which will certainly lead to legal challenges. Because this bill passed unanimously in both chambers, the highest RIED score any legislator received was 91.

Legislators favored businesses through tax policy this session. HB 2665 created the 'Pass Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019' which allows Oklahoma businesses to continue to deduct state and local taxes from their federal taxes. Other positive legislation included extending the tax credits for clean-burning motor vehicles (HB 2095), allowing tax credits for electricity generated from zero-emission facilities to be applied any time in the ten years following the date on which they were earned (HB 1263), extending the Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program to 2025 (HB 1089) and eliminating the population restriction on municipalities to receive Affordable Housing Tax Credits (HB 1411).

Legislators were also very pro-business with regulations. The 'Unity Bill' provided clarity and many protections for businesses with regulations on the emerging medical marijuana industry (HB 2612). SB 1003 created the 'Oklahoma Environmental, Health and Safety Audit Privilege Act' which seeks to encourage voluntary compliance with environmental and occupational health safety laws. The Interstate Medical Licensure Compact provides the framework and process for multi-state medical licensure of health professionals (HB 2351). This bill is designed to improve access to health care professionals in Oklahoma.

The legislature also continued its courageous push toward criminal justice reform by passing HB 1269. The bill allows sentence modification for convictions that have since been reclassified from a felony to a misdemeanor. It will allow for the expungement of felonies from a person's record, making it easier for that person to find employment.

Overall, the legislature seems to be more receptive to pro-business legislation, and is more focused on legislation that creates jobs, expands businesses and attracts new commerce to Oklahoma. It is my hope that this trend continues during the second session of the 57th Legislature which convenes February 3, 2020.

WHO BELONGS AND WHO GOVERNS

A board of directors elected by the overall membership governs the Institute. Institute research creates a profile of each legislator's individual voting record for bills dealing with business, industry, job creation and economic growth issues deemed important by the private sector. BILL SCORING AND EVALUATION

BILL SELECTION

Proposed legislation relating to business, job creation, elevation of income or economic growth can be nominated for evaluation. Nominations come from business interests, chambers of commerce, trade organizations, professional societies, academic interests, individuals and members of the legislature.

WEIGHTING

Bills are weighed on a scale from five to twenty with the most important legislation from this session receiving the highest weight. RIED staff reviews each bill and assigns an initial score. A private sector focus group comprised of RIED board members and representatives in the fields related to the proposed legislation follows the bill through the legislative process and issues a final recommendation. A committee made up of RIED board members or their designee meets to evaluate the bills being considered as well as to approve the bills used for final scoring.

BILL LIST

Legislators receive the current RIED bill list:

- After the first committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in their chamber of origin
- After the second committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in the opposite chamber
- Periodic updates are sent as bills are signed out of the conference committees (daily if necessary)

CALCULATION OF MEMBER VOTES

Approximately 20 of the most significant business related bills are used in calculating the final scores.

- Unless otherwise noted, legislative votes used for final scoring are the votes cast on final reading in both legislative chambers
- Member scores are determined by dividing individual points by the maximum number of points available
- Points are not deducted for absences. Absences do, however, represent a lost opportunity to score points. Co-authorship of a bill will be considered as voting in favor of the legislation.

BILLS ORIGINATING IN HOUSE

HB 1089**+20****By McEntire/McDugle West (Josh) (House) & McCortney/Scott/Matthews (Senate)**

Extends the Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program fee to December 31, 2025. Also extends the Hospital Advisory Committee, who advises the Oklahoma Health Care Authority on provisions within any state plan amendment or waiver affecting hospital reimbursement made necessary or advisable by the Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program Act to December 1, 2025.

Do Pass 96-0 House; 45-0 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 1263**+10****By Hilbert (House) & Pugh (Senate)**

Allows tax credits for electricity generated from zero-emission facilities to be applied any time in the 10 years following the date on which the tax credits were earned. Any tax credits remaining in the tenth year of carry forward shall be refunded at 85%

Do Pass 92-5 House; 39-6 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 1269**+20****By Dunnington/Echols/West (Josh)/Provenzano/Sims/Fugate/Goodwin (House) & Bice/Young/Ikley-Freeman/Matthews (Senate)**

Allows sentence modification for convictions that have since been reclassified from a felony to a misdemeanor. This will allow for the expungement of felonies from a person's record, making it easier for that person to find employment. The bill also directs the Department of Corrections to send reports of certain inmates to local courts and judges, and provides for procedures to ease expungement.

Do Pass 78-14 House; 34-11 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 1411**+5****By Nichols/Bennett (House) & Matthews/Smalley (Senate)**

Eliminates the population restriction on municipalities to receive the Affordable Housing Tax Credit and limits refundability to two years. This will open the program to builders in the metro areas.

Do Pass 68-24 House; 46-7 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2095**+10****By O'Donnell/McBride/Fetgatter (House) & Bice (Senate)**

Extends the tax credits for qualified clean-burning motor vehicles based on the size of such vehicles and caps the total credits at \$20 million.

Do Pass 71-13 House; 32-11 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2351**+10****By Caldwell (Chad)/Moore (House) & McCortney (Senate)**

Creates the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact, which provides a framework and process for multi-state medical licensure of health professionals. The bill also enhances the portability of a medical license. The bill is designed to improve access to health care professionals in Oklahoma.

Do Pass 97-0 House; 43-0 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2367**+20****By Kannady (House) & Daniels (Senate)**

Provides for numerous overhauls and adjustments to processes and procedures related to the Administrative Workers' Compensation Act.

Do Pass 85-0 House; 46-0 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2612**+20****By Echols (House) & McCortney (Senate)**

Creates the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana and Patient Protection Act, which provides for oversight and regulation of the medical marijuana industry, to be overseen by a Medical Marijuana Authority within the Department of Health. The bill contains clarity and protection for businesses.

Do Pass 93-5 House; 43-5 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2632**-20****By Echols et.al. (House) & McCortney et.al (Senate)**

Creates the Patient's Rights to Pharmacy Choice Act, which sets requirements on insurance providers and pharmacies to broaden patient access to care and improve transparency of the pharmacy process.

Do Pass 96-0 House; 47-0 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2665**+20****By Wallace/Roberts (Sean)/Kannady/McBride/Lepak (House) & Leewright/Murdock/Montgomery (Senate)**

Creates the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, which provides procedures relative to taxes and fees on pass-through entities to the state. This bill will allow Oklahoma businesses to continue to deduct state and local taxes from federal taxes.

Do Pass 96-0 House; 42-0 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 2739**+20****By Wallace/Hilbert (House) & Thompson/Rader (Senate)**

Makes an appropriation of \$5 million to the Governor's Quick Action Closing Fund.

Do Pass 81-16 House; 42-4 Senate; signed by the Governor

SB 1

Creates the Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency (LOFT), provides for an oversight committee structure and outlines duties and responsibilities of the office and the agencies it oversees. This bill should add transparency and accountability to the state budget.

Do Pass 38-8 Senate; 67-19 House; signed by the Governor

SB 100

By David/et.al (Senate) & Newton/Luttrell (House)

Relates to the practice of optometry by permitting eye doctors to operate in certain retail locations within certain standards, and provides for licensing, regulation and insurance requirements.

Do Pass 45-1 Senate; 90-0 House; signed by the Governor

SB 749

+10

By Rader/Pemberton (Senate) & Hilbert/Hasenbeck/Hill (House)

Defines "Public-Private Partner Development Pool" to mean the proceeds of obligations sold by the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority to assist local governments with infrastructure projects with for-profit businesses and federal government defense entities.

Do Pass 42-2 Senate; 93-0 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1001

By Leewright (Senate) & Roberts (Dustin) (House)

Prohibits political subdivisions from restricting, taxing prohibiting or regulating use, disposition or sale of auxiliary containers such as paper or plastic bags.

Do Pass 35-9 Senate; 52-42 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1003

By Allen/Daniels (Senate) & McBride/Caldwell (Chad) (House)

Creates the Oklahoma Environmental, Health and Safety Audit Privilege Act, which seeks to encourage voluntary compliance with environmental and occupational health safety laws.





FRESHMEN LEGISLATORS, NEW GOVERNOR DEFINE LEGISLATIVE SESSION; LEGISLATURE SEES FIRST SURPLUS IN FOUR YEARS

The Research Institute for Economic Development (RIED), a non-partisan organization and producer of the annual RIED Report, a grading system of Oklahoma legislators' votes on key economic development and business issues, announced today its 2019 RIED Report. The scores were awarded to lawmakers who served during the first regular session of the 57th Oklahoma Legislature. Over 50 freshmen served during the session.

Under the RIED evaluation system, legislators earn points when they support job creation and economic development issues or vote against legislation that is harmful to job creation and economic development. A score of 70 and above represents a passing grade while 69 and below represents a failing grade. Sixteen measures were utilized to compile the 2019 RIED Report.

"This was an interesting session on many fronts with legislators faced with a myriad of issues, including opportunities to advance pro-business and pro-job creation legislation," said Mark Williams, RIED president.

"The vast majority of Senate and House members received passing grades of 70 or above with 14 members scoring 91 which was the highest score of the session. One bill, HB 2632, prevented these legislators from obtaining a perfect 100 score, and other legislators from scoring higher. The bill was hotly debated throughout the session with pro and con advocacy groups weighing in throughout the process. After much negotiation, the measure ultimately passed both chambers unanimously and was signed by Governor Kevin Stitt. Despite the robust debate surrounding the bill, and its unanimous passage, the measure is anti-business on multiple levels and could not be supported by RIED. First, the bill requires contracts between private entities to be reviewed by the Oklahoma Insurance Department rather than be contracted on the open market without government

intervention. Second, the bill raises the cost of health insurance for any business that provides health coverage for its employees, and it raises the cost to consumers who purchase their own policies. Lastly, the measure fails to exempt plans governed by the federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), which translates into ERISA plans now being governed by state law which preempts federal law which will almost certainly lead to legal challenges. The legislature's passage of HB 2632 unfortunately cast a negative cloud over what otherwise was a positive and pro-business session for state lawmakers."

Overall, 109 of 149 legislators received passing scores of 70 or higher, including 40 of 48 Senate members and 69 of 101 House members. Fourteen senators and 32 representatives scored 85 or higher.

"With so many new faces in the legislature, I was curious to see how the entire body approached issues that impact Oklahoma's business climate and economy, both positive and negative," said Greg Love, RIED board chairman. Overall, I am pleased with the pro-business votes of the majority of legislators, however it is important to note how just one anti-business vote on a singular piece of legislation can send the wrong message outside our borders. Following the 2018 session, I stated how important it was for the executive and legislative branches to seriously address budget reform, and the manner in which fiscal decisions are made across state government. Progress was made this session, specifically in the form of SB 1, and I urge the legislature and Governor Stitt to continue to embrace policies and procedures that advance Oklahoma economically while positioning our state as a premier business destination."
